More than a Ride: The Role a Carousel Played to Desegregate an Amusement Park Kevin Patti - February 20, 2024 - 12:00-2:00 PM



Join us Tuesday, February 20, 2024 at Hillwood for lunch and a presentation from Park Service Ranger Kevin Patti on the history of 103-year old Dentzel Carousel in Glen Echo Park.

This illustrated talk will tell the fascinating story of the Dentzel Carousel company, the Glen Echo

Amusement Park that for 70 years surrounded the carousel and its central role in local civil rights and desegregation efforts.

Now operated by the National Park Service, Glen Echo Park continues to host the carousel, thanks to the work of former Glen Echo Councilwoman Nancy Long and the Save the Carousel Committee.

Kevin Patti has served the National Park Service for more than 20 years. He has also spoken about Clara Barton and works at the National Park named for her as well as Glen Echo Park.

Say Hello to Sonia Hampton



When Sonia Hampton retired from the Bank of America as a Vice President, she had 25 years of finance under her belt, including a previous, tenyear stint at Chase. Her first banking job was providing English-language services for an American Express bank in Japan, where she lived with her Navy husband.

When the Navy posted her husband to Alaska's Aleutian Islands, she took a job on a crabbing boat, selecting crabs to send to the mainland. Can anyone else here say they've done this?

Sonia was born in Puerto Rico and has lived around the world courtesy the Navy. I kind of fell into banking," she says. "At the time, though, they didn't hire women in executive positions" and her earliest job was secretarial. As times (and hiring practices) slowly changed, she entered mortgage banking, starting as a closer, then moved into processing, and finally, an officer position.

Sonia continued to travel with her second husband, a civil engineer who was President of the American Society of Civil Engineers. Their travels took them around the country and the world - wherever civil engineers held major meetings and Society fundraising events.

What was her favorite place to visit? "Antarctica. It was magical. The scenery, the water - it was beautiful." Sonia and her husband took a small boat trip one year in January, during the Antarctic summer. "We took Zodiac boats to visit different villages," she reminisces. The group also toured the renowned McMurdo Station run by the National Science Foundation.

Sonia cared for her husband at home until he died in January 2021 from Alzheimer's Disease.

These days, Sonia keeps in shape through Pilates. "It's hard," she admits. She enjoys MahJongg, which she learned last year.

One of Sonia's two daughters lives in the area, and she helps care for two young grandsons. Two granddaughters from her other daughter are in a military family. "Of all the different kinds of work I've done," Sonia says, "I am most proud of my girls."


Sonia will be taking her first solo trip this year to visit Italy. Give her a call to say "Ciao!"


